37 moves

5 different stances (walking stance, fixed stance, closed stance, sitting stance and L stance)

Toi-Gye is the pen name of the noted scholar Yi Hwang (16th Century), an authority on neo confucianism. The 37 movements refer to his birthplace on the 37 latitude and the diagram represents "scholar".

FUN FACTS

He was born on the 25th November 1501.

He was the youngest of 8 children.

Toi-Gye means "returning stream".

To increase his self discipline and concentration he played a game called 'tuhu', which involved throwing arrows by hand, into a jar with a small top from 2 metres away.

He was the head instructor at the national academy in 1552.

He worked in government and public service for 40 years.

He served 4 kings and he was one of the most influential figures in government for 37 years.

He has a street in Seoul named after him.

He is on the 1000 Won note

Here is his collection of poems called '*The Twelve songs of Tosan*' they were carved on 4 wooden blocks and are thought to be the oldest existing written version of traditional Korean poetry.
